# **Thoughts on Squadron Leadership**

am of two minds when considering my time writing about leadership philosophy. On the one hand, I am bewildered as to what qualifies me to write about leadership.

If I've learned anything from those who have taken time to teach me, it's that leading is best done by the humblest of humans.

On the other, I've been taught that a meaningful piece of leading is about devoting time to share experiences with those who will replace us. If by somehow penning a page will allow me to pour a better-quality runway for my replacement, I am honored to do it. For what it's worth, my leadership philosophy follows.

The two passages on this page illuminate the topic of problems and the difficult thinking and communicating that is required to solve them.

Einstein's idea was that peoples' understanding is predicated on and limited to their experiences. Einstein was making the case for the advancement of knowledge, which frequently requires new solutions to existing problems.

He reminds us that today's answers will not endure forever. In fact, evolution of thought is mandatory if one seeks to answer tomorrow's questions. Similarly, Galileo's words warn of the tensions that arise between long-standing institutions with entrenched positions and individuals who are keen and have the and courage to challenge those positions.

In light of the complex problems we face, one must consider both Ein-

stein's and Galileo's words carefully. Thus my leadership philosophy is founded on two lines of efforts: new solutions and courageous reasoning. The first line of effort, and possibly the most important, is providing new solutions to existing and emerging problems. Mission accomplishment is always number one, and undoubtedly thousands of distractions will tempt us to fo-

My role in this line of effort is to clearly identify mission objectives, inspire innovative solutions, monitor the progress towards these objectives, and not allow the routine to keep going.

The greatest challenge is to identify and implement necessary course corrections at the earliest opportunity.

The second line of effort is courageous and humble reasoning. Unsurprisingly, the problems that seek to mute or retard mission accomplishment will come gift-wrapped with deep-rooted positions.

My role in this line of effort is to have the sharpness and mettle to challenge those positions. In the past, more than one senior leader has offered the cliché, "Be careful what you are willing to fall on your sword for."

That counsel is improper. If something is preventing proper execution of our mission, I'm obligated to solve the problem. I understand I will be challenged, and I promise to not shy away from doing what is right for our squadron and the Air Force. In the long run, leadership models and clever catch phrases brief well, but do little pragmatically.

Thus, my leadership philosophy offers neither. Instead, my philosophy orbits around executing and inspiring innovative solutions and demonstrating the courage to not allow entrenched ideas to continue unchallenged. In the end, my leadership philosophy is predicated on the proposition of producing better *airminded* leaders than I could ever hope to be.

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## GATE PROJECT: ONE DOWN TWO TO GO ...

### ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. - And

there ya have it, - one down two to go. The Russell Parkway and MLK gates have resumed normal operations, and the Museum gate is closed until further notice. Phase 2 of the gate project starts Nov. 28 as construction moves to the Green Street Gate.

The Green Street Gate portion of the base's three-phase construction project to make entry and exit points safer is expected to last 21 days.

During that time period, The MLK Gate will remain open from 5 a.m. to 6 p.m. For morning traffic, three lanes will be used for inbound traffic until 8 a.m.

The Russell Parkway and the Watson gates will conduct business as usual.

To assist in relieving traffic, the Air National Guard Gate will be open from 5:30 to 8 a.m. for inbound northbound traffic only. It will be open for outbound (northbound traffic only) from 3 to 6 p.m.

The final phase of gate construction involves the Watson Gate and is slated to begin Jan. 5.

During that portion of construction, five lanes at the MLK Gate will be open from 5:30 to 8 a.m. to facilitate morning traffic. Three lanes

will also be open for inbound traf-

fic until 7 p.m., with two outbound lanes open.

Once the Watson Gate is closed, the Green St. Gate will have normal operations and the Russell Gate will be open 24 hours.

The construction being performed at the gates is a necessity to help ensure not only security but employee safety while traveling in and out of the base.

### AFPC NEWS: 2017 COMBAT AIR FORCES SQUADRON COMMANDER CANDIDATES ANNOUNCED

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RANDOLPH, Texas – Air Force officials have selected 302 officers as the 2017 combat air forces squadron commander candidates.

Candidates are eligible for any worldwide command opening to include 365-day extended deployment command opportunities.

Wing and group hiring officials will use the candidate list to fill projected 2017 CAF squadron commander vacancies.

Members appearing on this listing may also be considered for other command opportunities outside of the CAF.

"Not all officers on the candidate lists will get command assignments," said AFPC assignments officer Maj. Clint Carlisle. "The development teams typically select more qualified officers than there are projected vacancies to account for any unexpected events during the year."

The development teams reviewed all aspects of the candidates' records, duty histories, demonstrated leadership ability, professional development and permanent change of station eligibility to identify the most qualified for command.

"The selection process is highly

competitive," Carlisle said. "These candidates have demonstrated the leadership traits crucial for leading Airmen, setting goals and envisioning the future."

Furthermore, for the first time, the CAF candidate list includes an additional 68 CAF members previously selected by Air Education and Training

Command who also appeared on the recent HAWK squadron commander candidate list.

Capt. Ana Ruiz, CAF DT advisor at Air Combat Command, says this effort is groundbreaking.

"CAF wing commanders will no longer have to search through two separate listings to seek out new squadron commanders," she said.

Ruiz recently took over as advisor to the ACC/A3 for all rated officer developmental matters, including this command DT. Candidates will remain on the list if not selected for command until the list is superseded by the following year's results, unless they are removed for one of a variety of reasons such as selection for another assignment opportunity.

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## Youth Center, CDCs offer ways to keep Robins' kids busy during holidays

As the holidays approach, parents may be considering options for childcare as schools take a break.

Fortunately, Robins Air Force Base active-duty and retired military, Defense Department civilians, non-appropriated fund employees and base contractors don't have to go far to find quality care for their children.

Robins Youth Center, located in Bldg. 1021 at the corner of Ninth and Hawkinsville Streets, has programs Robins' youth can use to take boredom out of their vacation days.

Debra Bargie, Youth director for Youth Programs, said the center offers a lot of fun ways to pass the time.

The center will be taking youth to participate in the Feed the City community service project at Hope Church on Nov 18, from 6 to 8 p.m.

Nov. 19, from 6 p.m. to midnight, Robins Youth Center will host a Pre-teen and teen midnight-in. Youth must bring one toy with a value of \$5 to \$10, for a boy or girl, as admission to the event.

Robins' youth will be delivering Thanksgiving food items as part of a community service effort at the Community Outreach Center Nov. 22.

For youth who want to stick close to base, the center's Teen Room will be open Noon to 6 p.m. Nov. 21 through 23. The Teen Room will be closed Nov. 24 through 26 in observance of Thanksgiving.

To be eligible for the School Age Program, the child must be between the ages of 5 and 12 and be enrolled in the program; 5-year-olds must be enrolled in kindergarten.

For Open Recreation and the Teen Program,

youth must be 9 to 18 years old and must still be in high school to participate.

SAP is open Monday through Friday from 6:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. during morning hours and 3to 6 p.m. for evening hours.

The School Age Program can accommodate up to 60 children. However, there is no restrictions on the number of youth in the Open Recreation and Teen Program.

"The SAP cost is based on total household income." Bargie said.

"For Open Recreation and the Teen Program, youth can purchase a quarterly membership for \$25 or \$50 for an annual membership. If a membership is not desired the youth would have to pay a daily use fee of \$3 each time he or she visits the Youth Center. For the School Age program the cost is based on total household income."

Open Recreation and the Teen Room is open from 3 to 7 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and 2 to 10 p.m. on Friday. The Teen Room is also open on Saturdays from 5 to 10 p.m. unless there's a planned field trip.

With Christmas not far away, Robins Youth Center has its Christmas list ready to go.

Dec. 3, from 6 p.m. to midnight, the Youth Center will host its Passport to Manhood midnight-in for males only. The cost is \$10.
