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ANG F-15s hitch ride aboard C-5 for FMS deal with Israeli AF

hen the F-15 System Program Office's Foreign Military Sales team struck a package deal with the Israeli Air Force for the delivery of nine Air National Guard F-15s, the C-5 stepped up to the job.

The first eight aircraft were refurbished and flown to Israel earlier this year, with the final jet delivered via the cargo aircraft recently.

William Lyons, Logistics Requirements Developmental Program Flight chief in the 561st Aircraft Maintenance Squadron at Robins Air Force Base, said the cargo plane could get the job done for less.

"At first, we were going to do the delivery by freighter, but the C-5 was a better way to transport," he said.

The flight took some planning though. The aircraft had to be totally disassembled, with

all items created and boxed to fit in C-5 Shoring to keep the F-15 from shifting in flight, Lyons said.

The delivery process took about six months from start to finish, in which time boxes had to be made and shoring had to be retrofitted for the C-5.

"This couldn't have taken place without the help of the 78th Aerial Port Squadron and the 402nd Expeditionary Depot Maintenance team, along with the 561st Planning, Scheduling and Production Support Center," Lyons said.

Once Family, Always Family

Program gives Gold Star families access to base

nce you're part of the Air Force family, you're always family.

And, the Air Force family always takes care of its own, especially when a service member is killed in action.

Gold Star family members are defined as parents, stepparents, adoptive parents, foster parents, siblings and children of Airmen who were killed in action during international terrorist attacks against the U.S. or a foreign nation friendly to the U.S., or military operations while serving outside the U.S. as part of a peacekeeping force.

Mandie Holovach, a Community Readiness Specialist and Air Force Families Forever Program manager in the Airman & Family Readiness Center at Robins, said Air Force Gold Star family members fall under the umbrella of the AAFFF survivor support program and are given access to the support they may need after losing their military loved one in service.

"The AFFF is a long-term aftercare program established to provide proactive outreach to family members who have lost a loved one who was serving on active duty," she said. "The bereavement resources and support is tailored to suit the family."

On May 15, 2017, the Chief of Staff of the Air Force Gold Star Family Member Defense Biometric Identification System, or DBIDS, card initiative launched.

After a family member has been identified as a Gold Star family member, they will receive a letter signed by the installation commander closest to where the family member resides. The family member will begin the process of obtaining an identification card by providing the necessary documentation to security forces to obtain their ID card.

"Although this access will not authorize holders to use recreational facilities, commissaries or base exchanges, it does permit them access to attend vari-



ous programs and events held on base throughout the year," Holovach said.

Each branch of service has this program. However, they have differing definitions of Gold Star. The identification card only allows access to the base where they received the card. However, the Gold Star family member may request DBIDS card from any Air Force Active or Reserve Component installation that has a Visitor Center with DBIDS capability.

Robins currently has four Gold Star family members who have been issued ID cards.

The program demonstrates an open arms approach to Gold Star families, Holovach said.

"This program allows us to be able to provide increased inclusion for these family members at installation events and activities," she said. "It will also make it easier for them to access support services. In the past, Gold Star family members had to be escorted on the base to receive services. The new card will allow families to come on base without an escort."

For Gold Star mom, Kyhia Ruiz, and her family, the Gold Star program makes them feel not so alone in their grief.

"Maya and I really appreciate Robins Air Force Base for the ID's and their continued support since the loss of my daughter," Ruiz said. "It certainly helps to make us feel like a part of the Air Force Family and we look forward to visiting and attending any future events that the base will be hosting."

BLACK FLAG

n Middle Georgia, it's often too hot to do much of anything In August.

At Robins though, as the old saying goes, the show must go on.

To protect military and civilian workers as they meet the mission, the 78th Aerospace Medicine's Bioenvironmental Flight tracks the Wet Bulb Globe Temperature at Robins to decide appropriate work/rest cycles for those who work outdoors.

Airman 1st Class Katina Metasoumis, Thermal Stress Program manager in the Bioenvironmental Engineering Flight, said her team takes various factors into consideration.

"The WBGT calculation takes into account the ambient temperature, humidity, wind and solar load," she said. "The flag conditions are based on the calculated WBGT and are published in Air Force Instruction 48-151 along with guidance on work and rest cycles and hydration recommendations."

Metasoumis said rest should be taken in a cool area out of direct sunlight to allow the body time to return to a normal temperature before returning to work.

Flag conditions vary from no flag to black depending on the WBGT readings taken by Bioenvironmental Engineering.

"When there's an elevated heat condition, it's communicated

members on the flight line so they can implement appropriate measures to protect against heat stress," Metasoumis said. "Wearing a second layer of clothing, such as chemical protective equipment or firefighting gear adds 10°F to the effective WBGT while performing light work. Wearing body armor adds an additional 5°F."

Metasoumis said it's important to monitor weather conditions to keep people safe.

"Although temperatures this summer haven't been as high as in recent years, it's still important to have procedures to protect employees. If folks aren't properly hydrating or resting, there's a risk of a serious thermal injury."

WBGT readings are automatically updated every 15 minutes and heat conditions are posted on the Team Robins intranet website at https://wwwmil.robins.af.mil/index.asp. They're also posted on the Facebook page at https://www.facebook.com/ RobinsPublicAffairs/.

Computers also receive ad-hoc notifications when conditions are elevated to black flag.

The WBGT notifications and recommendations are no replacement for education, training and awareness. Individuals should stay alert to their condition and to the condition of their Wingman and take the necessary steps to prevent thermal injury.

ational Women's Equality Day will be observed on Saturday, Aug. 26.

Jeanette McElhaney, Robins' Diversity Council treasurer, said the day is set aside to commemorate the 1920 certification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, granting women the right to vote.

"This was the culmination of a massive, peaceful civil rights movement by women that had its beginnings in 1848 at the world's first women's rights convention, in Seneca Falls, New York," she said. "The observance of Women's Equality Day not only commemorates the passage of the 19th Amendment which was ratified on Aug.18, 1920, to the U.S. Constitution granted American women the right to vote an amendment known as the "Suffrage Amendment," but it also calls attention to women's continuing efforts toward full equality. 
McElhaney said it's important that women educate themselves.
