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Triple Ribbon Month

Team Robins to host educational events during October

ctober is a busy time for Robins.
The month is designated as Triple Ribbon Month, highlighting three important causes: Breast Cancer Awareness (pink ribbon); Domestic Violence Awareness (purple ribbon); and Drug Abuse Violence (red ribbon).

The month is designed to bring awareness and foster prevention to each of the causes through different activities at the base and in the community, said Marita Radloff, Team Robins Health Promotions registered dietitian/nutritionist.

"When base helping agencies and local community counterparts combine, it creates a greater awareness for everyone in Middle Georgia to pay attention to these causes that are affecting millions across the nation," she said.

Domestic Violence

According to Radloff, one in four women and one in seven men in the U.S are victims of physical abuse from an intimate partner at least once in their lifetime, a statistic that reflects the need for prevention and education in today's society.

"Each day, three women lose their lives as a result of domestic violence, and millions more live with domestic violence but don't voice their fears," she said. "Children who grow up in domestic abuse households are 15 times more likely to be victims of child abuse. Domestic violence costs the nation billions of dollars annually in medical expenses, police and court costs, shelter and foster care operational expenses, sick leave, absenteeism and non-productivity, and accounts for 15 percent of all violent crime."

Only community involvement and awareness will put a stop to these heinous crimes and create an environment that supports safe, healthy relationships, Radloff said.

Breast Cancer

Another focus of October is awareness and prevention of breast cancer.

"Breast cancer is the most common cancer in women, regardless of ethnicity, and the second leading cause of cancer death in women, following only lung cancer," Radloff said. "The chance of developing invasive breast cancer in a woman's lifetime is one in eight.

"In 2014, 236,968 women were diagnosed with breast cancer, and 41,211 women died in the United States from breast cancer," she added. "However, death rates from breast cancer have steadily declined, which is attributed to be the result of earlier detection and improved treatment, related to increased education and community outreach."

Drug Abuse Violence

Radloff said while drugs and alcohol abuse have been a problem in society for years, there has been an uptick in opioid drug abuse.

"Alcohol and drug abuse have reached epidemic proportions in the United States, calling for action from preventative education and community efforts to stymie the growing problem in America, particularly opioids," she said "More than six out of 10 drug overdose deaths involve an opioid. Since 1999, the number of overdose deaths from opioids, such as prescription opioids and heroin, has quadrupled."

Between 2000 and 2005, more than half a million people died from drug overdoses, and 91 Americans die every day from an opioid overdose, said Radloff.

Scheduled Events

October's events kick off with the **Triple Ribbon Proclamation** Signing Sept. 29 at 10 a.m. in the Central Georgia Technical College Auditorium.

There, mayors of Warner Robins, Center-ville and Perry — along with the Houston County Commission and the 78th Base Wing commander — will host a public ceremony at Central Georgia Technical College and proclaim October 2017 as Triple Ribbon Awareness Month, by signing the Proclamation for Houston County and Robins Air Force Base.

The annual Color Run 5k will be on Oct. 6 at 8 a.m. on the newly renovated 5k trail on base. The color run 5k is free and open to anyone with base access. No registration is required. Arrive at the parking lot across from Health Promotions Bldg. 827 between 7:40 and 7:55 a.m. prior to the race.

The first 500 people who check in at the

race will receive a commemorative pin.

The race starts at 8 a.m. Strollers, walkers and runners are welcome.

After the race, the **Team Robins Resiliency Fair** will host community and base vendors
and have free prizes, raffles and health
screenings.

The Resiliency Fair will be from 8 a.m. to noon in the old gym, Bldg. 827. Enter through Health Promotions doors.

The fair is open to everyone with base access and is free.

Health Promotions and community agencies will be at the **International City Farmer's Market** on Oct. 12 from 1 to 4 p.m., providing educational information and prizes.

The **22nd Annual Pink Picnic** at the Museum of Aviation will be Oct. 26, from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Community agencies and the Health Promotions team will also be hosting **road shows** along the base, providing prizes and education at different locations. These will occur from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Fridays.

"Bringing the community and Robins Air Force Base together to raise awareness and foster prevention for each of these causes is imperative to decreasing the rising deaths and helping those afflicted by these causes," Radloff said.

"By combining the ribbons, we bring a greater awareness to the problems millions of Americans face every day.

"Each ribbon signifies a unique struggle that can be lonely and isolating. It's time for Middle Georgia to stand with those people suffering from any of these causes and tell them they are not alone.

"Bringing light to these issues will hopefully help those in the area feel less alone and help prevent others from being afflicted in the future."

at Robins, recently met with Denise Atkinson, a

Crisis Line & Safe House of Central Georgia nationally certified Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner, or SANE, to discuss better ways to help victims of sexual assault at Robins.

Atkinson provides forensic exams to survivors of sexual abuse and has trained nurses across the state to become SANEs who use their training to care for sexual assault patients. She was instrumental in establishing SANE programs in both Houston and Peach counties, and is now working with the both Houston and Peach counties, and is now working with the Crisis Line & Safe House by establishing Sexual Assault Centers in Bibb and Houston counties where exams can be conducted outside of a hospital setting. The Crisis Line & Safe House is slated to open its onsite Sexual Assault Center in

McGinnis is a Judge Advocate who is authorized to provide independent legal representation to eligible victims of sexuallyrelated offenses. During their meeting, McGinnis and Atkinson discussed ways their organizations could work together to provide better services to survivors of sexual abuse at Robins.

Atkinson educated McGinnis about how a forensic examina-

tion conducted by a SANE can contribute to the collection of

evidence in a sexual assault case and ensure that a victim receives medical care for any injuries he or she may have suffered.

During a forensic exam, patients are informed about each part of the examination. A patient has the option to participate in all, some, or none of the examination procedures provided. Atkinson said that it is ideal if victims seek medical attention soon after their assault, but they should not be discouraged from inquiring about a forensic exam at any time.

The Crisis Line & Safe House of Central Georgia's mission is to provide community crisis intervention as well as safe shelter, comprehensive support and recovery services for victims of sexual assault and domestic violence, and to educate the community about the cycle of violence and its prevention. Robins' office of the Special Victims' Counsel's mission is to uphold the United States Air Force's commitment to deliver victimcentered advocacy that is comprehensive and independent for survivors of sexually-related offenses.

Hispanic or Latino

Team Robins Airman explains why it makes a difference

ispanic Heritage month is celebrated from the 15th of September to the 15th of October, so here is some food for thought about the words we use to refer to many people in the US and across the world.

For many Hispanics there is a very different meaning to the words Latino and Hispanic.

The Iberian Peninsula had many different names over the years, the Roman Empire called it Hispania. That is the origin of the term Hispanic, referring to those born in the Iberian Peninsula.

The term evolved to include the people of the new world as Spain colonized countries in what would eventually be called Latin America. This new meaning included all those who spoke Spanish and had a similar culture to that of Spain.

In contrast to Hispanic, Latino has a different meaning.
According to the Royal Spanish Academy, the word Latino describes people coming from countries in Europe and the Americas



that speak languages derived from Latin.

The most popular languages that fall under this category are Spanish, French, Italian, Portuguese, and Romanian. The word Latino in this respect refers to people from many different countries in Europe, Africa and the Americas.

In the U.S. most people use Latino (short for Latinoaméricano, Spanish for Latin American) interchangeably with Hispanic without realizing there is more to each word.

You don't have to change the way you speak or write but it is always good to be aware of the meaning of the words you use.


