

Service station to close temporarily

The gas pumps at the base service station will be closed Thursday as work continues on upgrades to the facility, including the installation of three new underground tanks.

The station will be shut down that day for installation of some of the equipment associated with the project, said Becky


McCoy, 778th Civil Engineer Squadron director.

A two-week shutdown is also planned in late April or early May as the changeover to the tanks and other new equipment is completed, she said.

The entire project is expected to be finished by mid-July.

Drivers needing gas when the base service station is closed can find a number of commercial stations to the north and south of Robins on Ga. Hwy. 247, and west on Russell Parkway, Martin Luther King Jr. Drive, Watson Blvd. and Green Street.

GAME FACES ON Robins readies for upcoming UCI team visit

The much-anticipated Unit Compliance Inspection is at hand. Although not all units will be covered by the UCI, everyone at Robins could potentially play a role in its outcome.

The inspection by an Air Force Materiel Command inspector general team is aimed at Warner Robins Air Logistics Center staff, the 78th Air Base Wing and the 402nd Maintenance Wing.

Although those organizations are targeted, all Team Robins members should maintain the same vigilance that they do every day, said Robins Inspector General Col. John Cote. Inspectors can write up any violations they see, even if they are not in the targeted areas.

Cote added the AFMC IG, Col. Tim Sakulich, thinks of his inspectors as human sensors who are always vigilant and alert to any non-compliance issues.

That could be particularly important because as a companion to the UCI, the AFMC Safety Office will conduct a separate Safety Program Management Evaluation. That addition will be transparent except for the fact it will include the 330th Aircraft Sustainment Wing and the 542nd Combat Sustainment Wing safety programs.

Lt. Col. Mark Austell, installation chief of safety, said the base is required to have the safety inspection every three years and it will use ratings of satisfactory, marginal and unsatisfactory.

The UCI will also be graded on three tiers: compliant, compliant with comments and non-compliant.

The advance team from the AFMC IG's Office arrived Thursday and the main team arrives Saturday. The inspection begins Monday and will last throughout the week. An out brief to senior leaders is scheduled March 15.

Cote offered some rules of engagement for the inspection. One of the most important, he said, is to let inspectors know up front of any

U-2S remains active in Haiti missions

Maj. Rich Mehl sat in a sports car at the south end of the Robins runway and pointed at a black speck just over the horizon. The speck was a U-2S reconnaissance plane returning from an 8-hour flight over Haiti.

After making sure his emergency brake was off and the car was in drive, Mehl was prepared to engage in a unique landing operation to safely bring home the iconic aircraft known as "Dragon Lady."

As the plane piloted by Maj. David Tifford approached the runway, Mehl gunned the car to begin the well-orchestrated maneuver. As he zoomed down the runway at about 100 miles an hour, the aircraft flew by and positioned itself in front of the vehicle. Mehl then closed to about 50 feet behind the plane and began calling out numbers.

"Eight, seven, six, five, four, three, two, one," he said as the black aircraft touched down.

Mehl was telling Tifford the distance

between the plane and the runway. That's because the aircraft's unique design makes it difficult for the pilot to gauge that distance.

The maneuver involves an incredible amount of trust between the two U-2S pilots.

The U-2S team – which includes a third pilot, a doctor, intelligence personnel and about 50 maintainers – are from Beale Air Force Base in Sacramento, Calif.

They have relocated to a new site to perform another mission.

The images they collected were used by those in charge of the relief effort to determine where to direct aid.

The team performed this mission about once every other day.

Most of the trips lasted about nine hours.

They were at Robins temporarily to fly missions over the Caribbean nation.

"The support here at Robins has been absolutely fantastic," Mehl said. "The 116th (Air Control Wing) absolutely catered to our every need. They made us feel at home."

Changes coming to on-base dialing

Callers to on-base telephone numbers from other on-base numbers will notice a change March 31 when the Robins phone system switches to DSN direct.

Calls to on-base phones from other on-base phones will require callers to dial a seven-digit phone number.

For example, commercial

numbers starting with 926 are now reached by dialing 6 and the last four numbers.

After the switchover, these numbers will be reached by dialing 468 and then the last four.

The following commercial numbers will have a paired DSN direct dial number:

926, now dialed 6, will



be dialed 468;

327, now dialed 7, will

be dialed 497; 222, now

dialed 2, will be dialed

472; 201 will be dialed 241.

Callers dialing from off base will not be affected.

They will continue to dial the commercial prefix (926, 327, 222 or 201) and the last four digits of the number.



It's the profession of arms, not the regression of arms

As Airmen, nothing is average about our responsibilities. On the global stage, we are responsible for our nation's security, the safety of its citizens and the preservation of its way of life.

To that end, and as stated in the Airman's Creed, we serve as “guardians of freedom and justice.”

On a much smaller stage but just as important, we are responsible for embodying Air Force culture and being good stewards of the profession of arms.

All Airman are on center stage and responsible for upholding our culture. However, I've seen examples where many Airmen have ‘exited stage right’ and their commitment to or understanding of our culture has deteriorated.

Embodying Air Force culture begins with a feeling deep in one's heart we are Airmen first and specialists second. Air Force culture is all the little things molded together which make us Airmen. Our core values, the Airman's Creed, Air Force histo-

ry, and standards of dress and appearance are just a few things that come to mind.

Embodying Air Force culture also entails keeping accurately informed of larger Air Force issues or ‘hot topics.’ Airmen must not only stay in tune with the Air Force's priorities, but they must exhibit effective followership by explaining and supporting decisions of our senior leaders.

Sadly, not all Airmen do.

During an annual awards banquet meeting, committee members were brainstorming fundraising ideas. I was just listening until an NCO mentioned his unit booster club made good money by having a ‘buy out of blues Monday’ fundraiser.

I couldn't believe what I heard. Who would approve of such a thing? Even if everyone

else was saying yes, somewhere along the way there should have been a senior NCO saying, “No, that is completely against what the Air Force expects and sends the wrong message.” Would anyone in their right mind ask Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton A. Schwartz or Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force James A. Roy if they'd like to partake in such a fundraiser?

After I expressed my discontent, another Airman mentioned his unit had a ‘buy out of physical training’ fundraiser.

What message are we sending? I feel very fortunate to wear my uniform and wouldn't pay a penny to not wear it. I vividly remember how proud I felt when I finally got my blues issued in basic training. I also remember proudly wearing my ‘Class As’ on my first trip home. It's not a

hassle for me to wear the uniform; in fact, when I retire I absolutely know I'll miss the opportunity to do so.

These reflections are just a few ways I answer the question, “Hey Chief, how do you feel about blues Monday?”

Being an Airman demands much more than you being good at your job. It is accepting a lifestyle and committing yourself to the profession of arms, regardless of your specialty. We can't ‘cherry pick’ what expectations we live up to, and we surely can't create an environment where our traditions, heritage and culture take a back seat.

The sooner a person makes the transition from being good at his or her job to being a good Airman, the sooner he or she benefits from the true meaning of military service.

self-identified deficiencies and associated action plans to correct them.

“Basically you want to self-identify before they find it,” Cote said. “It shows you are on top of your game.”

Other rules of engagement include:

- ▶ Corrective action plans are crucial. Inspectors will evaluate the effectiveness of those plans in correcting problems. They will look at root-cause analysis, leadership involvement, urgency and whether the plan specifically describes who does what and by what date.

- ▶ Any unit member can call “knock it off” at any time if he or she perceives a threat to safety.

- ▶ Inspectors will not use deception such as fake IDs to test security of restricted areas.

- ▶ During exercises, which may be required for the inspection, inspectors wear reflective vests and are not considered “players.”

- ▶ Inspectors will use exercise injects to evaluate individual and unit responses during exercises. If unclear, ask the inspector. Follow procedures you would normally use to deal with the inject.

- ▶ Communication and safety are paramount.

The lab in the 78th Dental Squadron makes crowns, dentures and just about everything else needed to help keep Robins Airmen ready to deploy.


In fact, the lab has a machine which allows it to make crowns almost immediately.




