




The 561st Aircraft Maintenance Squadron at Robins replaces about 27 miles of wire in each F-15 aircraft for which it performs maintenance.

Civilian hiring freeze in effect

Air Force officials announced the implementation of a 90-day hiring freeze effective immediately.

A firm commitment to keep spending within requested levels led to implement the hiring freeze across the civilian work force, officials said.

In addition to a 90-day hiring freeze, the officials plan to reduce temporary and term employees and will implement both the Voluntary Separation Incentive Program and Voluntary Early Retirement Authority program.

Officials project that all major commands, direct reporting units and field-operating

Fuselage to become first flight, loadmaster trainer for Afghan AF

A C-27A fuselage housed at Robins for the past year will become the first G222 flight and loadmaster trainer for the Afghanistan Air Force.

The 33,000-pound fuselage was loaded on a trailer Aug. 11 and taken into possession by the U.S. Army Program Executive Office for Simulation, Training and Instrumentation (PEO-STRI). It had previously been held by the U.S. Special Operations Command which in turn retrieved the aircraft from Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, Ariz.

From Robins, the fuselage will travel to Savannah and on to Trencin, Slovakia, where it will be reconfigured by Virtual Reality Media for simulation training. From there it will be moved to Kabul, Afghanistan, where representatives from NATO Air Training Command - Afghanistan will hand it over to aircraft maintainers and pilots.

With the overall mission to help build and sustain an independent Afghan Air Force, the fuselage simulator will teach Afghans how to properly load and unload an aircraft and how to transport troops. It will also provide pre-flight cockpit as well as medical evacuation training – all in a controlled environment while not putting wear and tear on live aircraft.

The fuselage simulator is one of four G222 aircraft simulators under contract by Fidelity Tech-

nologies to be built and eventually trained on by Afghan forces, according to Michael Younce, project director with PEO-STRI.

Two of those simulators will be used as flight training and basic aviation training devices, whose systems are subcontracted to Aeronautical Systems Engineering of Odessa, Fla. The other is an Mi-17 Russian helicopter, which will be used for flight training, also to be repurposed in Slovakia.

In 2008, the U.S. began working with Alenia North America to supply G222 aircraft to the Afghan Air Force. The program refurbishes retired planes from the Italian Air Force. To date there are 11 planes in the U.S., with a goal of 20.

It takes some effort coordinating aircraft from Italy to Afghanistan, said

Bill Wheaton, logistics specialist with the Center's Foreign Military Sales Office. Wheaton and his colleagues tracked the worldwide whereabouts of the C-27A and its parts prior to its arrival at Robins last year.

"They have a daunting task," said Wheaton, referring to training challenges faced by American trainers. "First, they're speaking English working with an Italian aircraft, and trying to train Afghans who speak Dari. They put in a lot of hours – and have a very important mission – while also doing operational missions to help supply the warfighters."

It took about six hours to remove the C-27A's center wing box, and load the 75-foot long aircraft on a flatbed trailer.

Civilian employee outprocessing

The Work force Effectiveness Division of Civilian Personnel, along with other counterparts on base, conducted a Lean event to revamp the Robins Air Force Base Form 43.

The form covers out processing of civilian employees.

Employees who are resigning, retiring, transferring to another Air Force Base or federal agency, or going on leave without pay to accompany a military or federal civilian spouse, must complete the form.

The immediate supervisor will initiate a form 43 to out process departing employees. The employee will out process through each organization listed on the form and turn in the completed form to the civilian personnel customer service desk in Bldg. 376.

In the event of an employee's death, or if an employee leaves federal service without completing the form, the supervisor of record is responsible for completion of the form.

The form is located at the Air Force e-Publishing. Search by ROBIN-SAFB43, and on the Blue Star (IT Central) under Helpdesk forms, Checklist, and Request.

The completed form will be maintained by civilian personnel for 90

days and then destroyed.

First class of worker helpers a success, new class of trainees now underway

The first year on the job has been an unforgettable experience for F-15 aircraft mechanic DeWitt Paschal.

Don't bother bringing up his age either, since the 62-year-old former race car builder is known around the 561st Aircraft Maintenance Squadron as the seasoned veteran who can teach a thing or two to younger trainees.

"Mechanics are mechanics," Paschal explained. "I'm just working on an airplane instead of a race car. It's just awesome – I feel like a kid in a candy shop."

Paschal is part of the 402nd Maintenance Wing Wage Grade Helper Formal Training Program, created in early 2010 to address the projected Robins shortage of about 800 aircraft mechanics and sheet metal workers.

One of 204 initially hired last year, by late 2012 Paschal will have undergone an intensive two-year program consisting of valuable classroom instruction and on-the-job training.

The program's success is due to the dedication of many at Robins, including a team of 15 work leaders or supervisors who work closely with student trainees to ensure class teaching is re-emphasized at the job site.

Darrell Welch, training specialist program manager for the wing, said the program has been well received in the maintenance arena and in production.

He pointed out the importance early in the program of pairing trainees with good work leaders.

"When you hire an employee, he's going to end up looking just like the employee you put him with," he said. "For example, put him with the best mechanic you have, and he's going to turn out to be a pretty good mechanic."

Scott Brady, an F-15 work leader with the 561st Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, currently trains 10 students with varying degrees of experience. He agreed that the program's early challenges were well worth the rewards.

"I enjoy their eagerness," said Brady, who has been at Robins for 11

years. "It's a great opportunity for them to get aviation experience they didn't have.

"It's unbelievable how well it's going now," he continued, "I firmly believe this is exactly the direction Warner Robins needs to be going. We need to spend time on training. We need to show that we're trying to make a better work force and a better product for our customers."

In the beginning, the idea of getting the program up and running proved challenging.

For example, within a three-month period in 2010, courses were developed by instructors at Robins Maintenance University, and candidates were sought who possessed industrial, production machinery, automotive or other metal-related experience, or those graduates of vo-tech schools who did not have aircraft experience.

The candidates were hired throughout the spring and summer to undergo the first year of the two-year program. The first group began working full time in May and August of 2010.

"Robins is critical to the economy of Middle Georgia," said Marty Tucker, who was the 402nd Aircraft Maintenance Group deputy director at the time. "Over the past couple of years, the AMXG has hired 400-

plus technicians with a minimum of one year hands-on aircraft experience.

"As several supervisors have said, these are some of the best and brightest mechanics we have today," he added. "They are eager to learn and strive daily to improve their technical skills, ultimately ensuring Robins' success in the future."

A total of 181 students are on track to finish their first year.

Trainees begin at the WG-5 level. Once each becomes proficient in his or her respective aircraft work areas, and completes the required classes and final evaluation, they are promoted to WG-8. After another year of formal classroom training and on-the-job training, they are promoted to WG-10 and become journeyman mechanics.

To date, 90 percent of trainees have reached their promotion due date and have begun working on the next cycle of training requirements. The trainees have already invested 17,672 training hours in their aircraft sheet metal and maintenance instruction.

As the program grows, Robins recently hired 135 candidates who will undergo training during the next two years in aircraft maintenance as well as commodities.

Two Team Robins members recently spent time in Brazil competing in the military version of the Olympics.

In number of participants, the CISM Military World Games is second only to the Olympics as the largest sporting event in the world. The event featured 6,000 athletes from 110 countries, and is held every four years.

"I thought it was pretty spectacular," Goad said. "I just wish more people knew about it."

The games featured an opening ceremony, just like the regular Olympics, in which teams from each of the participating countries marched out. Soccer legend Espaco Rei Pele opened the games.

“We are operating in a very challenging fiscal environment and are focused on meeting mission requirements with a reduced budget,” said Lt. Gen. Darrell Jones, the Deputy Chief of Staff for Manpower, Personnel and Services. “We are mindful of the potential impacts of budget constraints on our civilian force and their families, which is why we are seeking to reduce the need for involuntary measures.”
The 90-day hiring
