My very first column to the members of the Robins team came in the Thanksgiving issue of this newspaper.

In essence, it's an inspiring reminder of who we are. Robins has forged a 71-year tradition of excellence known worldwide.

Construction projects ongoing across Robins

Earth continues to be moved and indoor renovations are moving forward across Robins.

Currently, there are 51 ongoing projects, from parking lot upgrades and new building construction, to indoor projects such as repairing and replacing roofs and fixing alarm systems.

Last week, a new building off Robins Parkway held a ribbon-cutting ceremony. The 93,000-square-foot Air Force Reserve Command modular facility will be ready for move-in starting today, and is part of a long-term plan to consolidate off-base and on-base facilities into one head-

quarters complex. The construction was supported by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

AFRC is also in the midst of constructing a Deployment Readiness and Training Center across the street as part of its

complex.

New AFRC building to house several directorates

A new building off Robins Parkway will welcome about 400 occupants beginning today.

Construction on the two-story structure began in January and ended in May. The facility will temporarily house several directorates. Relocating to the new administrative building are A1 Manpower and Personnel, A4 Logistics, A7 Installations and Mission Support, and the Readiness Management Group.

The new building, which features wide walkway areas, cubicle stations, new furnishings and conference rooms, is part of a long-range plan to consolidate seven off-base and on-base facil-

ities into one headquarters complex.

The AFRC complex will include a Deployment Readiness and Training Center currently under construction across the

street, and an additional 343,000-square-foot headquarters building.

Col. Nick Desport, AFRC civil engineer and A7 deputy director, emphasized that the

modular blocks, or individual buildings, were prebuilt in off-site factories before arriving at Robins.

This prebuilt allowed construction to progress at a steady pace as the site was cleared and foundation was laid.

"Who would envision that we would take all those building blocks and put them together?" he asked. "I have never seen construction as efficient and organized, and done so fast in the 30 years of my career."

About 100 dignitaries and staff members from Headquarters Air Force Reserve Command toured the 93,000-square-foot modular facility May 30 following a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

RDA office in temporary space

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The Restricted Duty Administration Office in Bldg. 255 is in a temporary centralized location for the Robins workforce until it moves to its permanent location in Bldg. 207. The office opened May 29.

The one-stop shop allows workers who have experienced occupational or non-occupational injuries on the job to have a place where questions can be answered in a timely manner, and claims processing, tracking and monitoring to be performed at a single site.

Debra Foy, the office's disability program manager, stressed that the organization's goal is to foster an environment that supports and facilitates retention of employees with disabilities, and provides appropriate, meaningful accommodations so they may remain on the job.

"Besides the fact it's the law, an accommodation is an investment that promises an immediate return and is a valuable asset to our business," said Foy. "If we invest in our employees to help them achieve their hopes and goals, we will improve their lives, and they will consequently invest in the



daily jobs being performed at the center.

"Managers and employees have an opportunity to think creatively about how tasks are accomplished, and their innovative ideas may lead to process improvements that benefit more than a single employee and

potentially identify areas to prevent injuries," she added.

Including Foy, the team includes Dawn Morgan, 402nd Aircraft Maintenance Support Squadron operations research analyst, who has served on Robins' Workplace Safety and Health and Safety Management System Implementation teams; and Charlene Hallman, 402nd Maintenance Wing human resources specialist. A fourth position will be added.

There are currently about 700 individuals, including employees, who have been placed on short-term or long-term temporary or permanent work restrictions.

The goal is to decrease those numbers; taking care of workers so they can get back to work as quickly as possible.


KIRTLAND AIR FORCE BASE, N.M. (AFNS) – “Safety – It’s Personal” is the theme of this year’s Critical Days of Summer safety campaign, started Memorial Day weekend and runs through Labor Day weekend.

Not too long ago, I was tempted to ride my bike without protective gear. I didn’t feel I needed it.

When I collided with a

Briefly said, I’m alive today because my brother had insisted I put on a helmet.

AF leaders issue safety memo

– In a tri-signature memorandum, the top three Air Force leaders urged Airmen to create a culture of safety and watch out for one another.

Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton Schwartz and Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force James Roy issued the following letter May 25 as part of the Critical Days of Summer 2012 kickoff:

“We kicked off our Critical Days of Summer Campaign last month. This year’s theme ‘Safety – It’s Personal,’ reminds us that when it comes to safety, individual decisions can directly impact loved ones, friends, co-workers, and the entire Air Force family. Between Memorial Day and Labor Day, more Airmen die in off-duty mishaps than at any other time of year. We are determined to reverse this trend.

“Last summer, off-

duty mishaps claimed the lives of 18 Airmen. Sadly, many of those mishaps were preventable. Seventy-two percent of fatalities involved private motor vehicles, and almost half of those fatalities were alcohol-related. In some cases, victims did not wear seat belts.

“We must lead by example and create a safety culture that highlights the importance of proper planning, sound risk management, and wise decision making.

“Smart choices may include steps as simple as starting a trip with proper rest, using personal protective equipment, observing posted speed limits, avoiding driver distractions like cell phones, and never driving under the influence of alcohol. Such decisions save lives.

“Because one lost life is too many, we urge all Airmen to look out for each other, especially during the Critical Days of Summer. Thank you for your service, and all you do for our Air Force and our nation.”

struction of a new parking lot that will accommodate 146 parking spaces on Perimeter Road next to Bldg. 2390, and the demolition of buildings 659, 1515, 657, 288 and 87.




“We are demolishing whole facilities, including two warehouses and one near the museum,” said Becky McCoy, 778th

Civil Engineer Squadron director. “It is part of an Air Force initiative to reduce 20 percent of our footprint by 2020. We are consolidating and demolishing facilities across the Air Force, but at Robins this will be a challenge as we grow or take on new missions.”

Another project is a new \$64 million advanced metal plating facility with an estimated completion date of November. It will be located in the industrial

area near the existing plating shop in Bldg. 142.

The parking lot project south of Bldg. 215 has been completed and includes a net gain of 200 parking spaces. On another parking lot project west of Bldg. 645, work is ongoing to remove and replace deteriorating asphalt. C-130 crew delivers medical aid to Yemen

A C-130 recently saved the day for Yemen soldiers hurt in a suicide bomb attack.

The U.S. military provided medical treatment for soldiers wounded by the attack, which happened in Yemen's capitol.

MiCare enrollment is underway at Robins.

MiCare is the online secure messaging application available at the 78th Medical Group medical treatment facility. Secure messaging is built to facilitate secure, online communications between medical providers and patients.

The 78th MDG implemented this patient-centered form of communication in April. Thirteen and a half percent of clinic patients are currently enrolled.

The Air Force goal is to have 50 percent of patients enrolled within the first year, and Robins has set the bar even higher, aiming for 80 percent.
